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1. Foreword

The Centre of Children’s Nurse Education (CCNE) is pleased to present its directory of programmes for 2026. The CCNE is located in Children’s Health Ireland (CHI). The CCNE develops and delivers continuing education, training and professional development programmes across CHI (CHI at Crumlin, Temple Street, Tallaght, Connolly and the new National Children’s Hospital Ireland) and nationally. The Vision of the CCNE is to lead continuing education and continuous professional development to meet the ever-changing needs of children and their families. The CCNE Strategic Plan (2023) presents the strategic objectives for the Centre of Children’s Nurse Education (CCNE) for the period of 2023 – 2028.

All relevant continuing professional education and training programmes for nurses, provided by the CCNE, have NMBI Post Registration Category 1 Approval or are accredited with a higher-level institution. Programmes are open to all registered nurses and other health care professionals who care for children healthcare needs across the settings.

The CCNE is governed by a Board of Management, includes representatives from CHI and Nursing & Midwifery Planning and Development Units. The CCNE also collaborates with the Centres of Nursing and Midwifery Education (CNMEs) nationally in the delivery of national initiatives locally to staff. The CCNE continues to support the work streams involved with the Office of the Nursing and Midwifery Services Director (ONMSD), the National Clinical Care Programmes, including the National Clinical Programme for Paediatrics and Neonatology, the Children’s Hospital Group (CHG) and Leading the Way A National Strategy for the Future of Children’s Nursing in Ireland 2021-2031.

2. Philosophy of the CCNE

Children's nursing exists within a rapidly changing healthcare setting, where Registered Nurses must deliver quality care that is appropriate, safe, effective and efficient, thereby enhancing the outcomes for the child and family. Nurses need to constantly develop their knowledge, skills, attitudes and values to respond to new, evolving and enhanced nursing practice across all children's healthcare settings. The CCNE aspires to facilitate nurses (and appropriate support staff as required) with this process, by providing programmes that are relevant, based on best evidence and responsive to current and emerging children's healthcare needs.

The CCNE acknowledges that every nurse is responsible for their own life-long learning and in the identification of their individual learning needs. Each nurse has a unique learning style and the CCNE aims to provide an environment that encourages intellectual curiosity, creativity and self-directed learning for each nurse enhanced by active participation in learning and flexible teaching methods.

The CCNE values the wealth of knowledge and experience, both personal and professional that nurses as adult learners bring to the education setting. It endeavours to promote collaborative learning with the educator facilitating the sharing of knowledge and skills thus advancing deeper learning and furthering the development of reflection, analysis, critical thinking, problem-solving and competence.

The CCNE believes that continuous evaluation of the effectiveness of programmes is an essential quality mechanism to ensure delivery of education/training programmes that will ultimately benefit both the child and their family.

3. Procedure for Enrolment in Programmes





Centre of Children's Nurse Education Communications Strategy

Supporting the Parent who is Providing Breastmilk or Breastfeeding their Baby/Child in a Children's Healthcare Setting Blended Learning Programme

Aim of the Programme:

To provide participants with the opportunity to develop the knowledge, skills and attitudes necessary to support a parent who chooses to breastmilk feed and/or breastfeed their ill baby/child in a children's healthcare setting.

Learning Outcomes:

On completion of the programme, the participants should be able to:

- Recognise the consequences of not breastfeeding on short and long-term health outcomes for both babies/children and parents
- Formulate strategies for the promotion of breastfeeding in their workplace and community
- Demonstrate the positioning of the parent and baby for effective attachment and breastfeeding
- Evaluate the effectiveness of breastfeeding and recommend strategies for more effective breastfeeding
- Examine the challenges to breastfeeding an ill baby/child in a children's unit and construct plans of care with the breastfeeding and breastmilk-feeding parent
- Recommend techniques for effective breastmilk expression
- Evaluate the effectiveness of expressing breastmilk and recommend strategies for more effective expression
- Describe the resources that will support the parent and baby/child in the community

Care and Management of a Central Venous Access Device when used for a Child in the Community

Aim of the Programme:

To provide nurses with the opportunity to enhance the specific knowledge, skills and attitudes required to safely manage care for a child with a central venous access device in the community care setting.

Learning Outcomes:

At the end of the programme the participant should be able to:

- Identify and discuss the HSE (2017) Guideline for Care and Management of a Central Venous Access Device when used for a Child in the Community
- Critically discuss the care of a CVAD when not in use
- Explain how to change a needle free device and connecting line
- Discuss how to prime and connect a syringe driver to a CVAD for the administration of medication via a syringe driver
- Identify the risks of infection associated with the care and management of long term use of a CVAD in a child in the community
- Appreciate the psychological effect that a CVAD has on the child and family
- Outline the criteria for discharge planning when a child is going home with a CVAD
- Troubleshoot any common complications that may occur with a CVAD
- Identify the required Nursing and Midwifery Board of Ireland documents that the nurse must adhere to when managing the care of a child with a CVAD in the community.

2. Demonstrate effective communication by escalating concerns using the ISBAR tool
3. Identify and Initiate initial nursing management of the acutely unwell child
4. Demonstrate situational awareness to ensure safe and quality nursing care

Caring for a Child with Epilepsy

Aim of the Programme:

To provide participants with the opportunity to enhance the specific knowledge, skills and attitudes required to safely and effectively care for a child with epilepsy in the hospital, community and home settings.

Learning Outcomes:

On completion of the programme, the participant should be able to:

- Recognise and accurately record epileptic seizures
- Explain the nursing management of a child presenting with epileptic seizures
- Administer rescue medications safely and effectively
- Describe the non-pharmacological treatment options for children with epilepsy
- Evaluate the psychosocial implications of epilepsy on the child and his/her family
- Develop a discharge plan for a child with epilepsy, including home safety considerations

Aim of the Programme:

To provide participants with the opportunity to enhance the specific knowledge, skills and attitudes required to safely and efficiently care for a child with a gastrostomy, in the hospital, community and home settings.

Learning Outcomes:

On completion of the programme, the participant should be able to:

- Outline the indications for insertion of a gastrostomy in children
- Critically evaluate the nursing care of a child following insertion of a gastrostomy tube
- Discuss the nursing management of potential complications associated with a gastrostomy
- Recognise the nutritional considerations when feeding via a gastrostomy
- Discuss safe medication management when administering medications via a gastrostomy
- Discuss the psychosocial challenges that may be encountered by the child and his/her family

Caring for the Child with Haemophilia and Allied Bleeding Disorders

Aim of the programme:

To provide the participants with the opportunity to enhance the specific knowledge, skills and attitudes required to safely and effectively care for a child with a bleeding disorder.

Learning outcomes:

On completion of the programme, the participant should be able to:

- Differentiate between common inherited bleeding disorders in children
- Identify the different classifications of bleeding disorders
- Organise care for the child presenting for emergency management
- Compare treatment options for children with bleeding disorders
- Implement individualised treatment plans
- Calculate and prepare coagulation factor concentrate
- Describe the role of the multidisciplinary team in providing psychosocial support to the child and family

Caring for the Child with a Life-Limiting Condition - Level A Programme

Aim of the Programme:

To raise an awareness of the principles and practices of utilising a palliative care approach in the provision of health and social services for children with life-limiting conditions and their families.

Learning Outcomes:

On completion of the programme the participant should be able to:

- Describe the philosophy and principles of caring for children with a life-limiting condition, in any healthcare setting, by the multidisciplinary team
- Discuss the implications of a life-limiting condition for the child and family
- Identify the statutory and voluntary agencies that deliver services for children with life-limiting conditions
- Discuss appropriate pain management for children with a life-limiting condition
- Describe some of the common therapies available for children with life-limiting conditions
- Discuss the ethical issues related to palliative care for children

Target Audience: Registered Children's Nurses / Registered Nurses / Registered Midwives and Health and Social Care Professionals who provide care for children with life-limiting conditions and their families.

Caring for the Child with a Life-Limiting Condition - Level B Programme

Aim of the Programme:

The aim of this clinical professional development (CPD) module programme is to provide the participants with opportunities to acquire additional knowledge, principles, experiences and values, supporting the nursing care required to meet the needs of the palliative child with a life-limiting condition and their families.

Learning Outcomes:

On completion of the programme, the participant will be able to:

- Examine the principles and philosophy of Children's Palliative Care, and its impact on the delivery of supportive and holistic care for a child with life-limiting conditions
- Analyse the stages of child development in relation to life-limiting conditions and the trajectory of the condition to the time of death
- Assess, plan, implement and evaluation therapeutic aspects of nursing care and treatment for children with life-limiting conditions from a palliative care perspective
- Embrace a palliative care approach to end of life care, grief and loss of the child with a life-limiting condition and their families, including siblings
- Demonstrate leadership and communication skills within health and social care systems (statutory and voluntary) to provide quality child and family centred care
- Outline how policy, finance, and regulatory environments impact care for the child and family

Target Audience: Registered Children's Nurses / Registered Nurses / Registered Midwives who provide care for children with life-limiting Conditions and their families.

Duration: 5-7 day programme. The theoretical component of the programme will be delivered over a 3-week time frame.

Facilitators: Nurse Tutors, Clinical Nurse Facilitators, Clinical Nurse Specialists, Medical Staff, members of the Multi-Disciplinary Team and subject experts.

Caring for the Child/Adolescent with a Mental Health Disorder

Aim of the Programme:

To provide the participants with the opportunity to enhance, develop and extend their knowledge base and understanding of child/adolescent mental health. It will provide an overview of the management of young people with mental health difficulties, both in hospital and the outpatient settings.

Learning Outcomes:

On completion of the programme the participant should be able to:

- Recall the aetiology of child/adolescent mental health disorders
- Assess, plan, implement and evaluate the nursing care of child/adolescent with Anorexia Nervosa
- Outline the development of depression in child/adolescent and related drug treatments
- Explain pathological anxiety and how it affects the child/adolescent with specific reference to Generalised Anxiety Disorder and Obsessive Compulsive Disorder
- Describe the diagnostic criteria for Autism Spectrum Disorder, sensory/behavioural issues and the nursing considerations required
- Arrange the follow-up care required for a child/adolescent with a mental health disorder
